

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE November/December 2025

Dear Aurora Historical Society Members,

Our 2025-2026 season of programming is off to a good start. At the September 30 meeting, a captivated audience was delighted by Susan Marie Frontczak's reenactment of "Eleanor Roosevelt at the United Nations: Hammering Out Human Rights." Her monologue in character was inspiring and it provoked many thoughtful questions. We learned a lot about Mrs. Roosevelt and her work on the mid-twentieth century world stage to develop a Universal Declaration of Human Rights, interpreted by Ms. Frontczak in a warm and intimate manner.

The program for the November 25 meeting features Rick Crandall, who will speak on the "Freedom Memorial: Honoring Aurora's Legacy of Service." Mr. Crandall, a founding member of the Colorado Freedom Memorial, will describe its creation, meaning, and the lives it commemorates.

I have been recently pondering the purpose of a local historical society and how the Aurora Historical Society (AHS) fits that definition. According to the SAA Dictionary, "A historical society is a non-profit organization dedicated to collecting, preserving, interpreting, and promoting the history of a particular place, group of people, or topic. It plays a crucial role in promoting historical awareness and understanding

by providing a platform for research, education, and public engagement." A historical society has several functions, including collecting and archiving historical materials, research and education, public programs and exhibits, and community outreach.

What then is the AHS? According to our Constitution, "The purpose of the AHS shall be to bring together those people interested in history and especially in the history of Aurora, Colorado. Understanding the history of our community is basic to our way of life, gives us a better understanding of our city, state, and nation, and promotes a better appreciation of our American heritage." As members, we are invited to help the AHS fulfill this mission and better understand our heritage. Spanish-American philosopher George Santayana rightly phrased it in 1905, "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."



William Smith house – Landmark #2 Article written by Keith Outcelt

WILLIAM SMITH HOUSE IN ARAPAHOE COUNTY, COLORADO



William Smith house today

The brick, foursquare home known as the William Smith House is in Aurora's Highland Park neighborhood along the High Line Canal. It is the only remaining house of this style in Aurora. The home stands out from its neighbors thanks to its square floor plan, hipped roof, broad overhanging eaves with brackets and wrap-around porch. The house also features a built-in buffet with leaded-glass doors and stained-glass windows. The home has connections to the early history of the city, the founding of Aurora Public Schools and the creation of the High Line Canal. The city of Aurora and the National Register of Historic Places recognized the building's historic significance in 1986.

William Smith was born in Aberdeen, Scotland in 1860. As a young man he immigrated to the United States, sponsored by Lord James W. Barclay. Barclay was a member of the English Parliament and a director of the Colorado Mortgage and Investment Company of London, Ltd. The Colorado Mortgage and Investment Company, sometimes known as "the English Company," was involved in irrigation projects throughout the region, but is best known for its development of the High Line Canal. The High Line was constructed between 1881 and 1883 to bring water to the dry land farmers south and east of Denver. After he completed his contract with the High Line and Lord Barkley, Smith hoped to try his hand at farming. In 1882, he purchased farmland along a section of the High Line Canal in the vicinity of what is now Sixth Avenue and Peoria Street. On his small farm, Smith raised sheep, alfalfa, barley, corn, wheat and sugar beets in addition to running a small dairy operation. In 1910, Smith commissioned architect Joseph Wilson to build a home for his growing family.

William Smith donated land for Aurora's first school and worked to create a school district that would connect the many one-room schoolhouses that dotted the plains near Denver. He rode up and down the High Line collecting signatures from residents and petitioned Arapahoe County to create a new school district. In 1885, his request was granted, and School District No. 28 was formed. Its original borders stretched from City Park in Denver far into the eastern plains. This school district eventually became Aurora Public Schools, which is still known as District 28J. Smith was appointed to the school board, a position he held for fifty years, the longest term for any school board member in state history. He retired from the school board in 1935 and passed away on April 20, 1946. Various Aurora schools have borne his name.

The Smith house has remained remarkably intact for over a century. Members of the Smith family continued to live in the house until 1983, when William Smith's oldest daughter, Margaret, passed away. Much of the interior woodwork that Smith contracted remains in excellent condition thanks to preservation minded owners of the house.






Rick Crandall's topic for the evening is titled "The Colorado Freedom Memorial." The Colorado Freedom Memorial is located in Aurora, Colorado near Buckley Air Force Base. Constructed of glass panels that reflect Colorado's mountains and blue skies the Memorial holds the names of over 6,000 Coloradans killed or missing in action. They are grouped by war, but names will not be alphabetically listed. Much of the Colorado Freedom Memorial is meant to reflect the chaos of war, including the shuffling of names.

Air Force Veteran & long time local radio fixture Rick Crandall is the founder of The Colorado Freedom Memorial, the first memorial of its kind in the US. Through perseverance & a strong connection to the community, Rick has created a Memorial that honors the fallen from Colorado while enriching future generations with a forthcoming education center.


Historic Preservation Intern Report

Aurora's Short Track: Century 21 Speedway



Community Gallery: Jun 17 – Nov 2, 2025

From 1971 to 1974, the grasslands just south of present-day Denver International Airport rumbled with the noise of dragsters, stock cars and thousands of cheering fans. The Century 21 International Speedway once promised to place Aurora at the heart of the regional motorsports' scene. With a quarter-mile drag strip, a paved oval and figure-eight circuit, Century 21 was a bold and ambitious venue. Visitors to the exhibition will learn about other iconic Front Range tracks and prominent local drivers of the early 1970's.



Prehistoric Aurora April 22, 2025 to April 5, 2026

Aurorans know the picturesque view of the snowcapped Rocky Mountains or the golden plains with the pronghorn roaming. But what did Aurora look like one million years ago with mammoths and giant sloths. "Prehistoric Aurora" is a journey through geologic time that will take you on a ride through the story of earth's ancient past to the present; showing some of the fossilized plants and animals discovered in Colorado and literally, right here in Aurora's backyard", said T. Scott Williams, Director of the Aurora History Museum "we hope that this immersive exhibit excites and educates visitors of all ages to explore the earth's past and to imagine what life would have been like, when dinosaurs roamed the planet".

On Display in the East Hallway

Aurora's Historic Photos

Photos have a way of connecting the current generation with their past. This exhibit showcases a small sample of the over 30,000 images archived at the Aurora History Museum.

On Display in the Theater Room Trolley Trailer #610

This exhibit takes a deep dive into the history of electric streetcars in the Denver metro area and explores the story of Aurora's Landmark, Trolley Trailer #610 before it was an exhibit at the Aurora History Museum.

This exhibit was chosen to return to our museum by visitors in June and July 2023.

Growing Home & Trolley Trailer No. 610

Growing Home is a permanent exhibit about Aurora's history featuring Trolley Trailer No. 610, a fully-restored 1913 historic trolley trailer. The exhibit highlights people, places, and events from Aurora's history. It features over 100 historic photographs and objects, and the fully restored 1913 historic Trolley Trailer No. 610 in the new Ruth Fountain gallery. Go inside the trolley and experience 100 years of history first-hand. The exhibit was designed by Dennis Meyer of Filament Design/Build with support from museum staff.

In October 2012, the Aurora City Council approved funding for the construction of a new gallery and addition at the Aurora History Museum. Council resolved to name it in honor of Ruth Fountain, a former city councilwoman, community activist and museum supporter.

The Aurora Museum Foundation was instrumental in raising funds and in-kind donations through grants and support from local businesses, organizations, and individuals. The 1,630 square foot gallery was completed in November 2014. The addition was designed by Humphries Poli Architects and built by Palace Construction






